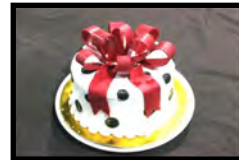

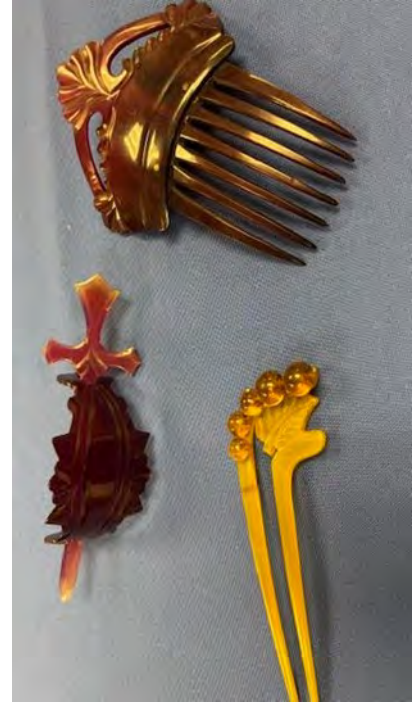

*"Gimme a head with hair--long, beautiful hair. Shinin', gleamin' Streamin', flaxen, waxen. Give me down to there. Shoulder length or longer (Hair!) Here baby, there mama. Everywhere, daddy daddy Hair, hair, hair, hair. Grow it, show it. Long as I can grow it, my hair."* (Lyrics by J Rado, G Ragni. Recorded by the Cowsills 1969)

If you want a change of hairstyle today, just make an appointment with your hairdresser. It's so easy. But back in the 1800s, women's hair was grown very long. It was rarely cut. Long hair was a symbol of virtue and femininity; letting it down was generally reserved for the privacy of the bedroom, often only seen by a husband or maid. Even women on farms and in country homes grew their hair long. It was often impractical to wear it cascading down so different accessories were used during the day to keep it styled and in place.

Hair accessories have been used for 1000s of years. They evolved over time to include hairpins, barrettes, headbands, and combs. One of the tricks to keep hair up during the day were 'rats'. For high-volume styles, these were pads made from their own collected shed hair.

Hair combs (see picture on the right) were, and still are, widely used. The earliest combs date back to over 5000 years and were made of wood. As time went on, bones, horns, tortoiseshell, and ivory were used to create beautiful and useful combs for securing hair. The more ornate, the higher the woman's social status. They were usually encrusted with pearls, gems, and feathers. The most valuable comb found is from the fifth century BC and was found in a Scythian leader's tomb near the Black Sea. It was made of 10 ounces of pure gold. The three accessories shown here are from the TOS Historical Society collection and appear to be from the 1920s.



Nowadays, since it is no longer practical and sometimes illegal to use bone, tortoiseshell, or ivory, combs are made of plastic, metal, or other synthetic material. They can still be ornate to fit the occasion, such as weddings, or plain for everyday use. Most are curved to better fit the shape of a woman's head.



Early curling irons, like the ones pictured here, go back to the 1700s. Sometimes referred to as tongs, iron versions were used by barbers centuries ago to curl the hair of their wealthy, sometimes royal, clients. Marie Antoinette hairstyles and even the men's wigs of the same era — barbers had to curl a lot of heads. Iron tongs were heated in a fireplace or on hot coals of small stoves. Curling your hair with early irons heated over direct flames required careful use. Testing the iron first with a piece of paper before putting it on the actual hair was essential to avoid the awful look (and smell) of frizzled hair. As technology progressed, electrical cords were attached to the irons. We now also have models that are heated by replaceable butane capsules, batteries, and USB chargers. They're a whole lot safer and less painful to use than the earlier versions but can still burn your ear or neck if not careful. The crimper and curling iron shown here are on display in our exhibit room along with many other interesting items.

Oh, the things women do to look extra special! Some things never change.

Chairman Costanza opened the meeting at 6:02 P.M. and led the people in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**Motion to Approve Minutes:**

Motion by Fusillo, second by Lindsay to approve the February 4, 2026 Planning Board minutes; all in favor.

**Public Comment:**

Supervisor Werczynski asked if there has been any further news regarding the East Schuyler Solar project. It was reported that there has not been anything new.

**New Business:**

Secretary Dingman read aloud an e-mail received from Catherine Nimey saying she won't be returning to the Planning Board as the alternate member.

Motion to Approve Resignation of Alternate Board Member Catherine Nimey by Finster, second by Lindsay; all in favor.

**Motion to Close Meeting:**

There being no additional business, a motion to close the Planning Board meeting was made at 6:10 P.M. by Tripoli, second by Fusillo; all in favor.

Following the meeting, the Planning Board members participated in an hour of training led by Secretary Dingman which consisted of a previously recorded Municipal Bootcamp webinar produced by MRB Group and Hancock Estabrook.

**Town Board Members Present:**

Supervisor John Werczynski, Councilmen Dale Dodge, Joseph Juliano, Eric Kane and George Luther III.

**Also Present Were:**

Town Clerk Kristin Salamone, Deputy Town Clerk Janice Rathbun, Highway Superintendent Philip Johnson, Clerk to Town Supervisor Jeffery Dingman, Codes Officer Bianka Rico, Town Attorney Mark Wolber and Town Residents Chris & Rick Proulx, Joseph Salamone, Herkimer County Community Development Director V. Jim Bono, Herkimer County IDA CEO John Piseck, Sarah Collignon, Harry Robbins, Anthony Lucenti, Mike Tartaglia, and Anthony Klimek.

Supervisor Werczynski called the regular meeting before the Town of Schuyler Town Board to order at 6:01 P.M. at the Schuyler Town Office, 2090 State Route 5, Utica, NY and led the people in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

**Motion to Approve Minutes:**

Motion made by Juliano, seconded by Dodge to approve the Town Clerk minutes from February 11, 2026 meeting; all in favor.

**Motion to Pay Bills:**

Motion made by Dodge, seconded by Kane to approve the bills as presented; all in favor.

**Presentations:**

C2AE Representative Mike Jantz updated the Town Board members on the Town of Schuyler Graham, Newport, and Brown Water District project. C2AE has sent documents regarding the project to USDARD (project plan, bids, cost, etc.) and hoping to hear back within 3 weeks with an offer. Jantz answered all town members' questions. Anthony Lucenti and Jay Grasso (grant writer) submitted the LGE (Local Government Efficiency) grant along with Northern Borders grant looking to favor water projects, applications to Gillibrand, Schumer, and Stefanik offices, and reached out to Claudia Tenney's office to get access to the \$1M grant money the town was awarded previously. Jantz requested a resolution be made for the increase of the current bond not to exceed \$12M aggregate principal amount of serial general obligation bonds to finance the construction of a new water distribution system of Graham, Brown and Newport Road water district in the Town of Schuyler.

Motion by Juliano, second by Dodge to increase the current bond amount up to \$12M; all in favor.

Herkimer IDA representative John Piseck updated the Town Board members on the State's mandate for the Town of Schuyler to install a 3-way traffic light at the Business Park for a safer entrance. The cost is \$1,200.00 for the maintenance contract and approximately \$100 a month for utility costs. John stated Herkimer IDA is paying \$380,000 for the light, installation of the poles, traffic signs and the correct signals.

John also stated there's a company interested in purchasing the last 60 acres in the park. They have entered a purchase sale agreement with a developer and will know by the next meeting if the land has been sold, which will bring more opportunities to bring even more revenue to the town.

Motion by Juliano, second by Dodge for a resolution contingent on whether the application fee of \$5,500 related to the traffic light can be waived; if the fee will not be waived, the town will pay the fee OR if the fee is waived, the town will not have to pay the fee; all in favor.

Attorney Mark Wolber reviewed the proposed Acadia Energy solar project contract. He emphasized his concerns for the decommissioning phase portion of the contract. Wolber's concerns are the responsibilities of the project owner seem to be conflicting. Mr. Lucenti stated he has already spoken to Acadia and the changes will be made to the contract.

**Codes Officer Report:**

Codes Officer Bianka Rico reported having done a couple of inspections, a new permit, and a permit for the Slavic Church.

**Highway Report:**

Superintendent of Highways Philip Johnson noted due to mild weather, the crew caught up on routine maintenance. The discussion shifted to the Frankfort Bridge construction that will continue this year and the conditions of the sidewalks around the town hall will be assessed.

**Supervisor's Report:**

A motion was made by Juliano, seconded by Dodge to approve the reimbursement of two employees who were shorted in their health insurance buy-out; all in favor.

A motion was made by Kane, seconded by Luther to approve the purchase of a new printer for the Town Supervisor; all in favor.

Town Supervisor reminded council members our first dumpster dates are approaching. The dates are April 18th and 19th, 2026.

**Planning Board Report:**

Planning Board secretary Jeffery Dingman reported that there are no new projects. He also stated that some training has been completed for some of the board members.

Jeffery recapped the Zoning Board of Appeals meeting for Acadia Energy Corporation, which will be held Wednesday, March 23, 2026, at 6:00 P.M.

**Herkimer County Legislator's Report:**

Anthony Lucenti reported the town will apply for the WIIA grant again. This grant is for West Schuyler water. The town is asking for an upgrade to this grant.

Anthony updated the Town Board members about work that is being done on the Wood Lane playground grant. Paperwork has been submitted to the State for this grant. He also stated Lowe's has a grant open for communities thinking the town could request a grant for trees and mulch for Wood Lane.

**Herkimer County Legislator's Report cont'd:**

Anthony told the board members the county is in the process of hiring a new County Administrator and already has a good candidate to fill the position. He also took a tour of the new Sheriff's administration building on Route 28. This building is the new location for obtaining pistol permits and training. Anthony wanted to thank Lou Christie for all his help at the County Clerk's Office for providing copies of the deeds and Mark Wolber for doing title searches on a couple of properties. The town is awaiting paperwork from the land surveyor for the Glenski property to file with County Mapping.

**Public Comment:**

Residents expressed their concerns about the water project.

A resident voiced concern about solar project contamination. Attorney Wolber, based on conversations with the engineer, assured the residents there are no liquids that would contaminate well water in the event of a broken panel.

The residents were reminded there is a meeting on Wednesday, March 25, 2026, at 6PM about the Acadia Energy (Gaetano) solar project.

Resident Chris Proulx was concerned about two properties in Schuyler that are falling in and/or are very close to the road. Town Board members will pass along her concern to the Codes Officer.

John Piseck inquired about when the zoning maps will be upgraded. Juliano stated at one time the maps were going to be updated and digitized, but nothing ever came about of it. Lucenti will set up a presentation for the Planning Board about the importance of updating and digitizing these maps. If the changes were already voted on, the maps should be updated.

Chris Proulx also mentioned the Town of Schuyler Historical Society held their first meeting of the year. They will continue to hold bake sales on election days. On April 12, 2026, from 2 to 4 P.M. the Historical Society will be hosting a presentation by Darryl Gillette, who will be speaking about the history of Schuyler going back to the Revolutionary War. All town residents are invited to this event. Bring your questions! Chris inquired about the town's plans for celebrating its 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the United States of America and working with other towns that may have ideas for this huge event. The Historical Society will help with whatever is planned. The Historical Society will hold their annual community picnic at the Town Park on Bowie Road.

Herkimer County Community Development Director Jim Bono responded with Herkimer County's plans for a HUGE celebration on Wednesday, July 1st, 2026, at Herkimer College including food trucks, the Syracuse Symphony, and the largest firework display in Central New York.

Chris Proulx relayed her son, Tim Riecker's concern about the December meeting regarding when the money will be paid back to the town since it is taxpayer money. Councilman Juliano responded that it was contemplated that this would be a question, but they determined it would be too costly for the Town to pursue it.

Harry Robbins wanted to thank the board and the taxpayers of the town for their contribution from the budget to help maintain the cemetery for another year.

Councilman Dale Dodge, who holds the Schuyler seat on the Mohawk Valley Water Authority, indicated there is a MVWA board meeting on Monday, March 23, 2026.

**Approval for ADP:**

Councilman Dodge also confirmed to the board members that ADP is the affordable company for payroll. ADP can set up the Section 125 plan (pre-tax payment) for all employees.

Motion by Kane, second by Luther to have ADP set up the Sect125 plan; all in favor.

**Close Meeting:**

There being no further business to come before the Board, a motion to close the meeting at 7:39 P.M. was made by Juliano, second by Kane; all in favor.

## **Summer Youth Employment Program Now Accepting Applications**

The Youth Summer Employment Program will soon begin accepting applications for the summer youth employment program. The program will run for 7 weeks, starting June 29 and running through August 14, and is for youth aged 16 to 20. The youth must turn 16 no later than July 6, due to NYS labor laws, and that is also the start date for many of the sites. The youth can work for a total of 112 hours at \$15.00/hour over the 7 weeks, which averages 16 hours a week, but depending on their site supervisor, they could work more hours in a week and be done earlier. They just can't go over 112 hours and must be done by August 14. The job sites are all non-profit, community sites such as parks, playgrounds, DPW's, libraries, etc. We maintain a list in our office and try to match the youth with a site that is close to their home, and something they are interested in.

Each Legislator receives 14 "slots" for youth within their district. Youth may e-mail Jeffery Dingman at [webmaster@townofschuylerny.gov](mailto:webmaster@townofschuylerny.gov) to request an application packet once they become available after April 22, 2026.

Also, please be aware that Herkimer County offers a bus program for those youth employed at Old Forge area businesses. The bus will run daily from mid-June through Labor Day and offers four pick-up points: Herkimer, Middleville, Newport, and Poland. Youth must get their own job in the Old Forge area, and then must come into the Youth Bureau for a bus pass and also to obtain a Sheriff's ID. Some businesses in that area may hire youth as young as 14, which may be a good option for those youth too young to participate in the Summer Employment program.
